Out of the Box

What is the point?

I can think of very few delicacies better than a bowl of freshly picked tomatoes and cucumbers dressed with a little olive oil, a splash of red wine vinegar and a sprinkling of Kosher salt, pepper and oregano. Price: about 4 bucks. The catch to this price is that you have to plant and water your own cucumbers, tomatoes, and oregano. Your \$4.00 will make at least 60 pounds of salad [yes, a tomato vine can easily produce 30 pounds of fruit over the season, cucumber production is a bit less, but a properly trellised vine will give you 1-3 cucumbers daily throughout the season.] If you have a trellis you might think about growing your own cantaloupe next to the cucumbers – they trellis nicely. Instead of \$2 for a mealy grocery store cantaloupe, pay \$2 for a plant and receive 10-12 melons with unparalleled taste.

The most underutilized source for the most nutritious, most delicious, and least expensive food on the planet is your own backyard. Throw in preserving techniques: freezing, drying, canning – and food prices start to approach free. I am convinced that every household should grow *some* of their own food.

Is it reasonable to think that a food pantry might also offer no or low-cost plants with workshops on planting, growing, harvesting, preparing and preserving food? Will Out of the Box become an organization that not only feeds people, but also teaches those of sound body and curious mind how to grow their own food?

I hope so.

Eat well and feed people whenever possible!


